Have a plan



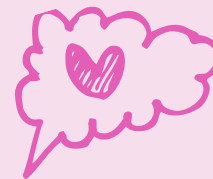
You can create your own plan or you can use the step-by-step guide provided by **Little Brownie Bakers®**.

STEP 1 Great to meet you!



Start with the basics.

1. Introduce yourself.
2. Ask if any girls have eaten a Girl Scout Cookie!
3. Explain what the Girl Scout Cookie Program is all about.
4. Ask if they have any questions – some questions you can answer right away and other answers will be part of your meeting with them.






STEP 2



Cookie knowledge

Review the cookie varieties your council offers.

- Be prepared to describe each variety.
- Have pictures of the cookies and boxes to reference while you are teaching.

How to sell

Girls will need lots of practice.

- Role play examples for door-to-door sales and booth sales.
- Encourage girls to practice what to say when a customer declines.

Money management

Play games to help girls identify money and count back change.

STEP 5

 *Play a game of Safety Charades or create Safety Tip Pinwheels.*

Safety comes first

Review safety rules.



1. Wear a Girl Scout pin and/or clothing to identify yourself as a Girl Scout.
2. Adults must accompany GS Daisies, Brownies and Juniors.
3. Always use the buddy system.
4. Have a plan for safe-guarding money with adults.
5. Never enter a customer's home or vehicle.
6. Sell only during daylight hours, unless accompanied by an adult.
7. Girls' last names and contact information should never be given out to customers. Use a group contact number or address overseen by an adult.



STEP 6



Marketing makes the sale

Provide supplies for girls to create booth posters, banners, sandwich boards or even cookie costumes.



STEP 7 Set some goals

Encourage girls to discuss.

- What could we do with the money to help others?
- What could we do with the money for fun and learning?

Teaching Tips



- 1. Don't talk for more than 10 minutes at a time.**
- 2. Break up your teaching with activities and games to get girls active.**
- 3. Get help from other adults.**
- 4. Establish a way to get their attention if they get too loud or distracted. You can use a simple phrase like, "If you can hear the sound of my voice, touch your nose." Repeat with ear, lips or chin until you have everyone's attention.**
