# NOT JUST ABOUT COOKIES—GIRL SCOUTS TACKLE HUNGER ACROSS GREATER L.A. ON DAY OF SERVICE, APRIL 23

Girl Scouts of Greater Los Angeles partners with L.A. Regional Food Bank for annual community action project

### WHAT:

Girl Scouts of Greater Los Angeles (GSGLA) is re-defining #squadgoals for today's teens, dispatching a service squad of Girl Scouts and volunteers to the Los Angeles Regional Food Bank on April 23.

Saturday's event kicks off GSGLA's annual **Feed Your Neighbor Service Week (April 23–30)**. The team of Girl Scouts will inspect, pack, and sort food for distribution, which will help thousands of local kids: Approximately 26 percent of children in L.A. County live in households that experience food insecurity. Overall, nearly 16 percent of county residents do not know where their next meal is coming from, according to the L.A. Regional Food Bank. Dozens of Girl Scouts and volunteers will help ensure food gets to this vulnerable population.

Feed Your Neighbor Service Week culminates in a food drive with regional Ralphs/Food 4 Less stores on Saturday, April 30. Community service projects help GSGLA achieve its mission of instilling courage, confidence, and character in girls who make the world a better place.
