Noticing the lack of opportunities in the Hyde Park/Crenshaw neighborhood of Los Angeles, Sarah remodeled a foster home bedroom and created a computer internet/homework area for a nonprofit mentoring group in the community.

A docent at the Cabrillo Marine Aquarium, Piper saw a way to enhance the learning experience of aquarium visitors. She assembled discovery boxes, encouraging hands-on learning about marine ecosystems. She took her presentation to elementary schools to promote environmental awareness.
