Girls are underperforming and underrepresented in science, technology, management, and government roles; they are regularly faced with unattainable images of beauty; they are more likely to live in poverty than their male counterparts; and, most importantly, they don't believe they can lead the change they seek. Only one in five girls believes she has the key qualities to be a leader.

As the largest girl-serving nonprofit in Southern California, Girl Scouts of Greater Los Angeles (GSGLA) is the organization to help girls overcome these barriers to greatness. Our studies show that through Girl Scouts, girls become confident, resilient, and creative problem-solvers ready to charter challenges and help others along the way.

OUR REACH:

UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES

We reached 16% more girls in underserved communities (our largest area of growth and the largest areas of need)—that's 10,000 girls in places like Downtown LA, East LA, and South/Central LA.



INCREASE

44% more LA-area kindergarteners started their Girl Scout paths.

TOP FIVE

Girl Scouts is more critical in Los Angeles than ever before. We grew from the 6th to the 5th largest council in the country (out of 112).

OUTCOMES

59% of girls stay in Girl Scouts each year. Retention is key. Research tells us that the longer a girl stays in Girl Scouts, the more likely she will have greater life outcomes that include income and education level—more-so than non-Girl Scouts.

DIVERSITY

Girls of all backgrounds benefit from Girl Scout programs. Our diverse girl membership continues to mirror the diverse ethnic landscape of California.





GSGLA moves at the speed of girls. With donor and sponsor assistance, we have enhanced our programs to provide important and unique opportunities for girls to shine.

29,410

girls participated in this year's Girl Scout Cookie Program and learned business and life skills.

A record number of 343 girls earned the Girl Scout Gold Award, the highest achievement in Girl Scouting. Each girl leads a large-scale project that addresses a community need in a sustainable way. Projects reached communities in underserved LA communities and as far away as India. Their projects focus on literacy, childhood obesity, bullying, and more.
