If you've seen Alta Loma High School's peace pole, that was part of Alyssa S.'s Girl Scout's Gold Award project. If you've walked across the bridge at Central Park in Rancho Cucamonga, that was also a Gold Award project funded and built by local a Girl Scout. Brownie Troop 10504 organized a book drive and donated over 100 books to the Friends of the Library Foundation at Paul A Biane Library. Troop 11204 has spent this year collecting canned food and donated over 400 cans to Touch Ministries. Troop 11264 purchased, decorated and donated a Christmas tree for The Assistance League's holiday auction to help raise money for local community volunteer projects. Troop 11374 made hand-made dolls to donate to San Antonio Hospital's pediatric wing.

Several years ago, Girl Scouts introduced a new program called Journeys. Journeys are fascinating activity books with exciting morals and lessons that can help girls in youth and as adults. "Girl Scout leadership Journeys invite girls to explore a theme through many experiences and from many perspectives through the three keys to leadership: Discover, Connect, and Take Action." These three keys help us be leaders by teaching us to break problems down. From badges to service projects, we start by learning about a topic (Discover), find how it is relevant to ourselves and our community (Connect), and then do something to make a positive change (Take Action). Journey topics range from Daisies learning to take care of animals to Ambassadors learning to use their voices to advocate for issues.

Our troop is now working on the MEdia Journey. We are learning about how media tells a story and how it can reinforce stereotypes. Since media can have both a positive and negative effect, we are using it to promote truth and positive awareness. To learn more about media, we designed a survey and asked over 100 people about their thoughts on media use, stereotypes, and changes they would like to see. Many people we surveyed felt that media lied and caused people (especially girls) feel bad about themselves. We are now using this information to reveal and remove some of the stereotypes we have encountered and use media to share a more accurate point of view.

Through our surveys and time spent talking to people in our community, one of the most eye-opening things we learned is that most people have a lot of misconceptions about Girl Scouts. Stories in the news have led people to believe that girls in troops are being taught to think a certain way or are encouraged to support or contradict controversial issues. They also seem to think that all we do is sell cookies and earn patches. But as you can see, this is very untrue. Since we've enjoyed Girl Scouts so much and want every girl to have the experienc-

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
